Description


Windy Mouth Cave, WV is formed in the contact of the Maccrady Shale and Hillsdale Limestone, Greenbrier Series. The cave is around 20 miles long.

There is one entrance to Windy Mouth, and an initial 900 foot hands and knees crawl is required to see any area of the cave. Knee pads are highly recommended in this cave.

After the initial entrance crawl, you may encounter 3 to 15 foot high walking passage, canyon passages, streams, dome pits, waterfalls, and gypsum crystals near the back of the cave. Several large loops, with lots of crawling, parallel the series of passages from the entrance to the Waterfall Room.

This trip will turn off into the Second Canyon, where large canyon passages can be explored, plus some very nice gypsum and formations. The turn off for Second Canyon is before you get to the Waterfall Room.

Take note that the hike to the cave is along the Greenbrier River and includes possible wading through the water along rock ledges. Water levels are low, though, so it may not be too bad. There is a steep climb from river level up to the entrance, but there is a handline in place to make it easier.


BRG Cave Trip - Porters Cave, VA

Bat Cave Closures -

Some WV and VA caves have closed for the **winter** hibernating period for bats. Other caves may be open for the winter. The winter closure does not affect all caves. Check the closed list, and please go elsewhere if your intended cave is closed. *There are thousands of caves in the Virginias*. pictures of the newbies on the Natural Bridge & we explored a little around that area.

After getting back through the Keyhole, we headed over to Grand Ave. & played around there. I had everyone go through the awkward/ tight passage near the back & Jeff was kind enough to take some great pictures of everyone.

Next stop on the tour was the Formation Room. We looked at all the pretty formations, fossils & cave crickets. On the way out we took a

We headed out through the waterfall entrance to the main entrance. We were in the cave about $4 \frac{1}{2}$ hours. I believe everyone had a good time.



2023 CRF Mammoth Cave Thanksgiving Expedition

The Cave Research Foundation (CRF) held it's 2023 Mammoth Cave Thanksgiving Expedition from November 22 to November 26 at the Hamilton Valley field station. Bill Koerschner and I drove up on Wednesday in time for a nice pizza dinner that evening.

Besides dinner, the most important activity that evening was recording Distox2 readings on the compass course. Then it was lots of socializing.

Thursday, Thanksgiving, was reserved for shorter trips. After much shuffling of personnel, I ended up on a trip with Bill Koerschner, Bill Baus, and Ljubomir Risteski (LJ) to survey at the end of the A survey in New Discovery section in Mammoth Cave. I had been there in July 2023, so I knew what to expect. Lots of gypsum, nice walking passage, some breakdown squirming, and then tiny leads that needed to be surveyed. It was a fun day of 8 hours with 270 feet of survey. We made it out just in time for dinner at 7pm. Yum. Article & photos by Dave Socky

Friday was another trip to a different section of New Discovery. I went with Ljubomir Risteski (LJ), Mills Orlovsky, and Henry Grover - our trip leader. Lots more crawling to get back to the KW survey where we checked and surveyed side leads that needed to be done. Again, most were small, either ending as too tight, or looping back to the main passage. I didn't fit into some of the passage we surveyed. This was a longer

10.5 hour trip which netted a whopping 323 feet of survey.

Our final day of caving, on Saturday, was a trip into Crystal Cave with Tom Brucker as the trip leader. We had two teams for a total of 7 cavers.

I had surveyed in this same area back in July 2023. The S Bend was as easy as I remembered. I was a little concerned about the

Keyhole, but it turned out to be easier than I thought. I didn't even have to exhale to get through. Coming back was more difficult because there was nothing to push against. The Bottomless Pit crossing was easier than I remembered, too.

We split into two teams. Tom, Megan, and I surveyed tall nice canyon. Not real hard to sketch either. We soon tied into the other teams survey. We caught up with them at Floyd's Jump Off. The climb up was funky, but a rope was rigged which we used as a handline.

While Jenny finished her sketching, we heard many historical stories about this section of the cave from Tom. Recommended reading - *The Caves Beyond* by Roger Brucker.

We headed out a different way and actually avoided the climb across of the Bottomless Pit. The trip out was hot and sweaty. I overheated, but managed ok. It was an 11 hour trip with 205 feet of survey in the book.

10/21 - Lost Cave, WV - Susan Burr, Jeff Huffman, Nick Schmalenberger, Lauren Appel, Trish Geiger. We had a nice trip into Lost Cave. The entrance area had a little trash that we hauled out on the way back to the car. The trail to the cave was a little overgrown & had several downed branches in the way. We wondered if we should clean up the branches or leave it to deter random visitors. We basically left the brush. There wasn't much of a waterfall flowing, but it did have some water going into the cave. We spotted a couple of salamanders as went into the cave & Lauren found a crayfish. We discovered a lot of broken glass in the entrance area. We didn't really have anything to safely put glass into to remove it, so we tried to move the larger pieces off the main trail. There was also some other trash & fresh graffiti in there. We discussed the possibility of going back for a conservation project to clean it up sometime in the future. We basically explored evervwhere we could. It doesn't have a lot of formations, but we did see a few. There were also a lot of tight and/or awkward squeezes & passages to get through. One I did with grace. NOT! Basically, I slid out doing a handstand & almost ended up on my face. LOL! I believe we were in there about 3 hours.

10/? – **Tawney's, VA** – Margo went into Tawney's with the VPI Cave Club. They asked her to lead them to the Moon Room, and then they made it back to the "stripper pole."

10/25 Perry Campbell Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Mark Minton, Yvonne Droms, Keith Sweeny, and Rich Lambert. Mark, Vonnie, and Dave went into the high lead that Joe Zokaites and Dave had surveyed on a previous trip. Keith and Rick went toward the bottom to map geology in the cave. Mark bolted up the climb that Joe had free climbed. Mark then bolted up the rest of the way using 3 bolts. At the top, the hole to continue small. It would take some technical digging to continue. We called it a day and exited the cave at 6pm. We plan on going back.

11/3 Perry Campbell Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Mark Minton, and Yvonne Droms. We returned to the bolt climb we had done a week ago. Joe went up first and enlarged the first constriction enough to get close to the second. After some beating with the sledge, he hauled up the drill and straw supplies and put in one short straw. He then rappelled down. The dig got us through. Mark was able to squeeze past the constriction. He found a small room with a ceiling full of breakdown where you could see space above, but it would be a death dig. We decided it was not worth it. We surveyed the find and then exited the cave right around 4:30pm.

11/8 NCKMS (National Cave and Karst Management Symposium) in Chattanooga, TN. Field trip stops: Cumberland Caverns, Grundy Spring, Big Mouth Cave, Big Room Cave, Jasper Blue Spring, and Ruby Falls (where the NCKMS banquet was held.

11/11 Island Ford Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Mary Sue Socky, Meredith Weberg, and Janet Tinkham. Stopped at the entrance on the way to the WVCC banquet. I went in as far as the entrance room. Talked to a caver couple who were taking their two kids on a cave trip.

11/11 - WVCC **Banquet**, WV – John Pearson and others attended the banquet, and praised Mike Ficco's presentation on *Caving in Montenegro*.

11/12 Culverson Creek-Hinkle Unus entrance, WV. Participants included David Socky, Mary Sue Socky, Meredith Weberg, and Janet Tinkham. The day after the WVCC banquet we visited the entrance to Hinkle Unus because Meredith and Janet had never been there. Dave Socky went back into the narrow canyon until it started to get annoyingly narrow. Didn't go back as far as the crawl.

11/13 Shenandoah Wild Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Casey Tucker, and Carl Amundson. The entrance is a narrow slit going down at a steep angle into a small room. It's easy to get it, but getting out was a real challenge. Having a rope helps. At the end of the small room is a small hole going down. It is tight, probably about 12 inches max. I had to take my vertical stuff off to fit. Soon after this was the two drops to get to the lower part of the cave. One drop was over flowstone and then through a narrow window into a large room. The second drop was about 25 feet. After this drop, we took our vertical gear off and caved several hundred feet (or so) until we got to our lead. It was an up climb that we used an etrier to get up. It was all virgin. But it didn't last long although we left two leads - one a dig lead with a little air and the other a yucky dig lead which is probably not worth the effort. We surveyed a total of 169 feet for a 5 hour trip.

11/15 Warm Spring Project, VA. Participants included Dave Socky, Rick Lambert, and Keith Sweeney

- Black Widow Pit. Dave Socky reports rappelling part way down this dead bottom pit. There was a tight spot about 15 feet off the floor I didn't feel comfortable going through, so I did a DistoX shot to the floor and then set a station halfway up. Climbed back up and finished the survey. There is a C class dig at the bottom.
- Mitchell #2 Pit. This pit was larger, so Dave Socky was able to drop all the way to the bottom. Did one PUD shot and then surveyed out. There was a side pit halfway down but couldn't get to it because of breakdown blocking the way. There was nothing at the bottom but a 3-inch drain crack. Surveyed 60 feet or so.
- Perry Campbell #2 dig, plus 3 other potential digs.

11/23-25 Mammoth Cave, KY. CRF Thanksgiving Expedition

- New Discovery (A Survey). 8 hours with 270 feet of survey
- New Discovery (KW Survey). 10.5 hours with 323 feet of survey. (Continued on page 98)

• Crystal Cave KY (YM Survey). 11 hours with 205 feet of survey.

11/29 Warm Spring Project, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Rick Lambert, Bill Pickett, Keith Sweeny, and Josh Webner

• Massie #1 Cave. We were going to survey this cave, but there was a bear snoozing inside! We had talked about the possibility of a bear - there was one last year, but we figured it had been too warm and they would not be bedding down yet. Keith offered to go in first. The entrance is a 10-foot climb. At the bottom is a tight crawlway which then opens up into a room. Keith squirmed into the crawl, looked up and saw the bear just a body length away from his face. Needless to say, Keith backpedaled

- Singularity Sister Cave. This was a known cave with no air and was a dead bottom drop but needed to be surveyed. Joe, Josh, and I surveyed it with five stations. The entrance was almost straight down, tight, and awkward. Easy enough to get into, but a pain to get out. There were old dried formations. It was 27 feet long.
- Spinning Singularity Cave. Joe pulled some rocks from this dig, after which we could see it was possible to enter after a straw or two. Unfortunately, it ended after dropping down into a small room. The survey length was 67 feet.

• Singularity Cave. We did a surface survey from Spinning Singularity Cave to Singularity Cave. Singularity Cave has been surveyed, but the map still needs to be drawn. There is the need to find out where the air comes from too. Like Spinning Singularity, the air comes out of the entrance quite strongly.

12/2 McClung Cave, WV. Participants included David Socky, Nikki Fox, and Anthony Fagan. We met at 10am on a cloudy drizzly day. Went back to the far end of Wafflefoot to clean up side leads. The leads back there turned out to be small and gnarly. They either ended or tied back into the main Wafflefoot passage. For a fourteen-hour trip, we only got 259 feet of survey. Our average shot was around 7 feet with 34 stations. But, it was a fun trip!
