Note: The trip to Rapps Cave is contingent on Riley confirming she can lead the trip. If not, an alternative will be determined and announced via the BRG list serve.

Description

Rapps Cave is gated with access controlled by the West Virginia Cave Conservancy (WVCC). This cave contains a paleontological site and protected Native American glyphs and artifacts. Permission is required in order to visit this cave.

The Rapps Cave entrance, 4 feet high and 10 feet wide, slopes into a large room (20 feet high by 80 feet wide, and 100 feet long), with a floor of smooth clay and flowstone and some columns

on the east side of the room. The cave consists of two main passages. One extends approximately 2400 feet to the west and is intersected by numerous small dead-bottom pits and long low rooms. The other passage extends about 1000 feet to the NW as a broad passage, floored with huge slabs of breakdown covered with

formations. The cave may continue, but no way through the breakdown choke has been found. The far end of the Breakdown Room connects with another room where prismatic jointing is prominent in the ceiling.

There are multiple levels within the cave. There are pits, a lower level with a long, 4-foot-tall room containing a slippery mud floor. In another area of the cave there is a dome pit with a waterfall. There is a big canyon, and 1,375 feet of upper-level passage.

Rapps Cave is formed in the Union limestone, with over 5000 feet of surveyed passage. It is hydrologically connected to nearby Buckeye Creek Cave, WV.

Dixie Caverns Conservation Project

The Blue Ridge Grotto held a conservation project in Dixie Caverns on Saturday, February 22, 2025. We had 15 volunteers: Mary Sue Socky (organizer), Marian McConnell, Trish Geiger, Cyndi Hutchinson, Jeff Huffman, Lauren Appel, Nick Schmalenberger, Meredith Weberg, Jessica & Ben Hester, Rolland Moore, Abby Arbeiter, Alex Thompson,

Bambi Marshall, and me. Our goal was to help clean the caverns but especially remove the "green" from around the lights and on formations, especially the "Wedding Bell" formation.

After everyone was ready, we all grabbed some supplies and headed into the cave. Once inside Mary Sue started

telling us what formations and where the cave manager/owner wanted us to clean. We carried the gear up into the cave & set up a staging area for all the supplies we brought in. Mary Sue then explained & demonstrated how to clean the different areas. We then left to tour the rest of the caverns and to see the areas that needed cleaning. Afterwards

> we returned to the supply area and gathered what we needed to clean the area we wanted.

> We may have had a minor setback with the water situation, but we managed. The pipes inside the cave were frozen, so Trish, Abby, Jeff & I took all the sprayers and water bottles back outside the cave to find and fill them up with water. Carrying them all back into the cave was not fun! Mary Sue then started mixing her hydrogen peroxide solution as the rest of us began cleaning the sections we had chosen.

I chose the section next to the "Turkey" formation and asked Jeff to help me. It had 2-inch moss growing toward the light which I found funny looking. Removing that was my favorite part of the cleaning. Jeff and I both scrubbed the area. I did leave Jeff for a few minutes to take pictures of everyone cleaning. Because I get bored easily doing the same thing, I started scrubbing a few other places in that same room.

When someone came around and told us

to wrap it up because pizza would be there soon, Jeff rinsed the area we had been cleaning and then sprayed the hydrogen peroxide solution. While we waited the 15 minutes for the solution to do its thing, Jeff helped me gather clay to fill in around one of the lights on the other side of the room we were in. Trish and Lauren had both worked on removing the green around it but ended up stopping because it was removing too much of the clay that was holding up the light. Jeff and I spread out the clay to help cover the leftover green and to fill in the holes

around the light fixture itself. Then Jeff did the final water rinse to the area we had cleaned.

As we headed out of the cave, we got to see the work everyone had done. It was FANTASTIC!!! Luckily, everyone had before & after pictures of their areas they cleaned. We went out and had a great pizza lunch together provided to us by Jenna, the owner/manager of the caverns.

After lunch we all did a final walkthrough with Jenna to show her our work. She was very pleased and thankful. We did not get everything cleaned, so we are probably going to organize another trip one day.

Ridge Walk and Burruss Cave #2

Warm Springs Anticline Cave Survey & Karst Assessment Project Trip Report January 15, 2025. Keith Sweeney reporting.

Recent snowfall followed by freezing rain and single digit temperatures had transformed the Falling Spring Valley into a nearly impenetrable blanket of ice. Access to their projects through unbro-

ken fields and lanes was out of the question.

On Tuesday, Keith posted these local weather conditions to the WSP group, essentially declaring that the digging & logger replacement priorities would not be possible and that the only thing a person could possibly do in such conditions was to throw on some crampons and field walk looking for snow melt around steam vents. Keith envisioned a relaxing day staying warm by the wood stove since a nighttime low of 9° was forecast for the valley and figured no sane person would want to venture out in such weather.

sponded with interest, they decided that doing Something was better than doing Nothing, so an 11:00 a.m. meet up time was agreed upon.

Keith text-notified 4 property owners of potential intent and the next morning he and Dave drove to the Hoover property to look at a feature there. Jason pulled in

right behind them, so they all entered the small sink-hole. Even though Keith & Rick Lambert had evidenced air there before, no opening was visible in the snow.

From here Keith led the way to the John Mitchell property hoping to walk a couple areas where steam vents had been reportedly seen by Joe Massie thru the years. But first they started at the back of the property near Black Widow Pit &

Burruss Calf Hole, hoping to find something that was missed in earlier forages.

Keith was also hoping to hear a reply from Bill Wilson allowing permission to search his land for a known cave that Keith & Rick Lambert had failed to find during their geologic surface mapping many months previously.

As they were wrapping up their unsuccessful search

for new openings, Bill Wilson's truck drove by heading to his house. Keith had no cell phone service, so after having

Dave and Jason sign the waiver that Keith had brought with him, he drove up to Bill's house and gained permission to search his land for the elusive "Burruss Cave No. 2".

After a 20-minute search the 3 foot by 6 foot opening was located!!

Lots of underbrush, vines and broken limbs were strewn across two 10 foot long logs spanning the entrance. Keith GPS'd the location and marked it with orange survey ribbon while Dave & Jason hiked the short distance back to the vehicles to get a hatchet and webbing. The logs were pulled out, brush thrown to the side and plans for rigging the vertical entrance from trees was discussed before leaving to search one last area on the way back out. This is an excellent find and it made their day of walking on ice very satisfying.

VSS data lists this cave as having been first reported in 1945 and last updated with an estimated, unsurveyed map in 1954. It will require a survey. It appears to them as possibly being unnoticed and untouched since 1954.

Of particular interest is its location compared to Warm River Cave's eastern trending line plot and 4 drops totaling 110 feet into unexplored territory!

Unfortunately, and somewhat disappointingly they noticed that the snow was not melted around the entrance rim like they hoped it would be. The opening is large, and air movement would not be readily noticeable of course but they're still excited!

They drove back towards Rt. 220 and parked in Joe Massie's driveway to access the final slope exploration in search of snow melt vents, but none were discovered. They took pictures of Massie Cave No. 2 as they passed by before reaching their vehicles for the ride home at 3:45 p.m.

The NSS wishes to thank all those who took their day to help with this count on a cold yet sunny February day.

191 Total (all 3 caves) live bats were counted.

Area Cave Closures

The Caverns at Natural Bridge (orig. Buck Hill Cave), Rockbridge Co. VA Show Cave closed in 2024. CNB now part of Natural Bridge State Park. No other details. It is unlikely that CNB will open in 2025.

Catawba Murder Hole, Botetourt Co. VA is closed to visitation.

Giant Caverns, Giles Co. VA is now owned by the West Virginia Cave Conservancy. A management plan is being developed. The cave will be open for qualified vertical cavers. Stay tuned!

Norman Cave, Greenbrier Co, WV. The WVCC (cave manager) has announced there has been an issue with parking at Norman Cave. It is advised not visit this cave entrance until this matter has been resolved. There are plenty of other Greenbrier caves that can be visited instead, so plan accordingly.

Moler's Cave, WV, is currently closed until the property's legal matters are resolved due to Dr. Latterells's passing. Any attempt to visit the cave could negatively impact the outlook for future visitation. There is a working group on the property keeping an eye on the property.

Organ Cave, Greenbrier Co. WV show cave continues to be closed for renovations.

Giant Caverns has a new owner - the WVCC

2/2025: Today was a good day. We closed on a property & now have our 3rd Virginia cave preserve. The WVCC is pleased to announce the acquisition of Giant Caverns in Narrows, Virginia. Early in the 20th century this was a commercial cave but has been dormant for 80+ years. The entrance is in a 40' nearly vertical sink that opens into pit about 50' deep. The pit drops into a large heavily decorated room (similar to Lost World) with passage heights around 60'. The cave is not known to be extensive but a mapping project may change that. There was a horizontal tourist entrance at one point that has since collapsed. We will evaluate whether it is feasible to reopen it. In the meantime, access will be via the pit entrance by vertically competent cavers.

The WVCC was able to cover the cost of the purchase through our acquisition fund that our members have generously funded. We have depleted a good portion of it and now need to replenish it so we can work on our next acquisition. Your donations are tax deductible and greatly appreciated.

We will develop a management plan in the near future. The cave will be maintained as open to qualified vertical cavers. Dan Crowder, from the VPI Grotto, has volunteered to be the preserve manager. Much thanks to Wil Orndorff for facilitating the entire process of acquiring the property.

Nikki, Eli, and I started with the left-hand lead in the access passage to the Muddy's. This was the longest piece we did. Then we cleaned up two small leads on the right in the Little

Muddy's. Nick and team finished off leads in the Big Muddy. By the time we finished, around 9pm, we had finished off all the leads. The Muddy's are done! We came out to a 20 F evening around 12:30am. We had changed in the cave. We didn't get stuck in the snow, and we had surveyed 267 feet for a 12.5-hour trip.

1/15/2025: Burruss Cave #2, VA. Participants included David Socky, Keith Sweeney, and Jason Sargent. We went ridge walking in the snow and ice with 18 Degree F weather. We also found Burruss Cave #2 which was known but only had a sketch map from 1954. See the article on page 11.

Fifteen cavers showed up with nice things to eat, we watched old cave videos and had fun with Nick Schmalenbergers' new squeezebox.

Dixie Caverns Threat

NOTE: This proposed rezoning goes before the Roanoke County Board of Supervisors on April 1, 2025, at 6 p. address: 5204 Bernard Drive, Roanoke, VA 24018

The person who owns the Caverns Mart at I-81 X 132 wants to put a 4-story hotel behind his convenience store – he wants to rezone the property from residential to high density commercial and overdevelop it.

For a Roanoke Time article on this issued dated 2/25/2025, see this link.

The proposed hotel would tower over the Dixie Caverns property and cause excessive runoff from the proposed hotel property onto the Dixie Caverns Campground and buildings.

• Fallbrooke Drive-(gravel road) would become the only expanded, enlarged, paved delivery/access road to the hotel.

- Fallbrooke Drive and other easements have been greatly expanded in the proposed plan, to the detriment of adjoining landowners.
- Where would the construction and parking lot runoff go? Downhill is the Dixie Campground. Dumping water into a culvert on the Dixie property below the site does not seem adequate.
- This hotel runoff, in addition to the 150% increase in runoff from the planned I-81 construction, will overwhelm the Dixie Caverns property, campground, parking lot, and building during rain events and floods.
- Doesn't off-ramp realignment of I 81 affect this proposed site?

If you can, please show up at the public hearing for the project on 4-1-2025 rezoning meeting and voice your opinion on the rezoning and development and its

impact on nearby properties. You don't have to be an expert, or a county resident. You DO have to sign up ahead of time to speak at the Board of Supervisors Public Hearing.
